

Easter Story – (Story taken from the Gospel of Mathew) by Reena Thomas




After Jesus finished the Lord's Supper, Jesus, along with his disciples, went to a place called Gethsemane, and he said to them, "Sit here while I go over there and pray." He took Peter with him and the two sons of Zebedee. Grief and anguish came over him, and he said to them, "The sorrow in my heart is so great that it almost crushes me. Stay here and keep watch with me." Jesus threw himself on the ground and prayed to his father to take the cup of suffering from him, if possible, but prayed that the father's wish be fulfilled.

Then Jesus went away again three times to pray saying the same words. When he returned he saw the disciples sleeping. The first time

when he came back and saw them sleeping, he said to Peter, "How is it that you three were not able to keep watch with me, even for one hour? Keep watch and pray that you will not fall into temptation. The spirit is willing, but the flesh is weak". The second time when Jesus went away, he prayed to the father to remove the cup of suffering, if not, the father's will be done. When Jesus returned he found his disciples sleeping again for they could not keep their eyes open.



He then said to the disciples that the hour has come for the Son of Man to be handed over to the power of sinful men. "Get up, let us go, look, here is the man who is betraying me!" At that time, Judas one of his disciples, arrived with a large crowd armed with swords and clubs sent by high priests to arrest Jesus. Judas went straight to Jesus and said, "Peace be with you, Teacher," and kissed him as arranged earlier with the priests by Judas. They then arrested Jesus and took him before the council.



Jesus was taken to the house of Caiaphas, the High Priest, Peter followed him from a distance as far as the courtyard of the High Priest's house. The chief priests and the whole council tried to find false evidence against him to put him to death. But two men stepped up and said, "This man said, I am able to tear down God's Temple and three days later build it up again". The High Priest stood up and said to Jesus, "Have you no answer to give to this accusation against you?" But Jesus kept quiet. The High Priest put him under oath and asked him if he was the Messiah the Son of God. Jesus answered him by saying, "So you say, from this time on you will see the Son of Man sitting on the right of the Almighty and coming on the clouds of heaven". At this the High Priest tore his clothes and said, "Blasphemy! they do not need anymore witnesses, he is guilty". The crowd agreed with the High Priest and said that he must die.

During this time, Peter sitting in the courtyard was asked by the servant girls if he was one among Jesus disciples, but he totally denied this in front of all of them. Peter was asked the same question by two other people, but he denied and asked what were they talking about. After the third time, the cock crowed and Peter remembered what Jesus told him: "Before the cock crows, you will say three times that you do not know me". Peter wept bitterly.

Early in the morning all the chief priests and the elders made their plans against Jesus to put him to death. They put him in chains and sent him off to Pilate, the Governor of Rome. Jesus stood before the Roman Governor who questioned him, "Are you the king of the Jews?" He asked. Even though Pilate asked him several questions, Jesus remained silent, which surprised the Governor. At every Passover Festival the Roman Governor sets a prisoner free, the crowd asked for. At that time there was a well-known prisoner called Barabbas. The crowd asked him to be set free and Jesus to be crucified. Pilate set Barabbas free and after, he had Jesus whipped and handed him over to the crowd to be crucified.



Then Pilate's soldiers took Jesus into the Governor's palace, and the whole company gathered around him and mocked him in many ways, knelt before him and said, "Long live the King of the Jews!" When they finished mocking him they led him out to crucify him. As they were leaving, they met a man named Simon and the soldiers forced him to carry the cross. When they came to a place called Golgotha, which means "The Place of the Skull", they offered Jesus wine mixed with bitter substance, but after tasting it, he would not drink it. They crucified him and divided his clothes among them by throwing dice. Above his head they put the written notice of accusation against him: "This is Jesus the King of the Jews".

At noon the whole country was covered in darkness, which lasted for three hours. At about 3 o'clock Jesus breathed his last with a loud shout, "Eli, Eli, lema sabachthani?" which means, "My God, my God why did you abandon me?" When it was evening, a rich man from Arimathea named Joseph arrived. He asked Pilate for Jesus body, which he took, wrapped it in a new linen sheet, and placed it in his own tomb which he had just recently dug out of solid rock and placed a large stone across the entrance to the tomb and went away. On the Sabbath at the request of the chief priests to Pilate, the tomb of Jesus was ordered to be guarded by guards.



After Sabbath, Sunday morning, Mary Magdalene and the other Mary went to look in the tomb. Suddenly there was a sudden Earthquake: an angel of the Lord came down from heaven, rolled the stone away and sat on it, his clothes were white as snow. The angel spoke to the women. "You must not be afraid", he said, "Jesus who was crucified is not here, he has been raised just as he said." The angel advised the women to break the news to the disciples as well. So they left the tomb in a hurry and ran to tell the disciples. Suddenly Jesus met them and said, "Peace be with you." They came up to him, took hold of his feet and worshipped him.

Jesus said, "Do not be afraid and tell the disciples he will see them at Galilee".



This Easter Season, wherever you may be, may God hold you in the palm of his hand, now and forevermore.



Ash Wednesday

It is a custom to burn the palm crosses from the previous year's Palm Sunday and use the ash provided as a "paint" to draw the crosses.

Did Les attend the church services? No. Did he come to church every Sunday? Yes. Was he happy with church and its members? Yes. Les was straightforward and simple, a person who spoke his heart, kept nothing to himself, and ready to support whenever it was necessary. The last time I met him was at his home back from hospital after the treatment. We spoke almost for an hour, matters pertaining to faith, community and some church history. He mentioned his discontent about changing the carpet in the



church; pointing out that the old one should have lasted for another ten years; yet at the same time commended the new carpet. I probably did the most adventurous thing in that meeting; presented him with a Bible. Happily receiving it, he kept it on the table even when Lorna suggested that she will keep it safe in her custody. He had clear thoughts about his life, how life should be led, and how things should be done. And I wasn't amazed by the fact that he had everything arranged for his funeral service. He knew the ins and outs of Bundoora Square, quite concerned about the increasing inconveniences, and was quite acquainted with many in and around Bundoora.



Mark the Evangelist

Mark the Evangelist was a follower of Peter and so an "apostolic man." Mark was born in 5AD in Cyrene, Pentapolis of North Africa and died in Cyrene, on 25th April 68AD, aged 62. In AD 49, about 19 years after the Ascension of Jesus, Mark travelled to Alexandria and founded the Church of Alexandria, becoming the first bishop of Alexandria. The Prayer of Thanksgiving, can be traced back to Mark himself. He is honoured as the founder of Christianity in Africa. Mark, the author of the second gospel account, is symbolised by a winged lion — a figure of courage and monarchy. The lion also represents Jesus' resurrection (because lions were believed to sleep with open eyes, a comparison with Christ in the tomb), and Christ as king. This signifies that Christians should be courageous on the path of salvation.



Saint Mark is the Saint of Barristers, Egypt and Mainar. Saint Mark's Feast Day is April 25th



St Mark's major shrine is in The Patriarchal Cathedral Basilica of Saint Mark, commonly known as St Mark's Basilica, and is the cathedral church of the Roman Catholic Archdiocese of Venice, northern Italy. It is the most famous of the city's churches and one of the best known examples of Italo-Byzantine architecture. The Basilica began with a swashbuckling tale of kidnapping. The first St. Mark's Basilica was built on this spot in the 9th century to house very sacred relics—relics that had been stolen! In 828, merchants from Venice stole the body of St. Mark the Evangelist, from Alexandria, Egypt. According to the legend, they snuck them past the guards by hiding


them under layers of pork fat in barrels! While at sea, a storm almost drowned the grave-robbers and their precious cargo, it's said that St. Mark himself appeared to the Captain and told him to lower the sails. The ship was saved, and the merchants said they owed their safety to this miracle. The entire story is pictured on the 13th-century mosaic above the left door as you enter the basilica. This mosaics took eight Centuries to complete, are mostly in gold, and the results are astonishing. If you enter the Basilica at different times of day you can see how the light makes the colours, and scenes, look different.
